I'm teaching a comparative politics class and would like to create a lesson that helps students to understand the difference between What is the difference between a state, nation, government, country and regime.

The following is a suggested lesson plan for teaching the difference between the five terms:

between a state, nation, government, country and regime. Students will have the opportunity to explore each term in detail and address the connections between each term. Through this lesson, students will be able to comprehend and define the terms accurately and clearly.
